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A YEAR In Reuiew

Each year when we come together, we reflect on the success we have had throughout the year and can feel proud of the difference we are making in the lives of Survivors and in our communities. This year was no exception but it was also a year of many firsts.

This year we developed Canada's first and to date, only Youth Violence Prevention Immersive learning program, leveraging digital and virtual reality tools to prevent the victimization of youth. We answered calls to action through the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls Inquiry and the Truth and Reconciliation Report. We embedded a Victim Services Crisis Counsellor in an acute care hospital to ensure real time support for Survivors where and when they need us. We built a community garden at our office to help address food insecurity.

Throughout many conversations this past year we have heard staff, colleagues, community partners and government officials refer to mandates, job descriptions and policy directives. These things exist to meet the expectations of the systems we work within and to ensure accountability, none of which will ever truly capture the real depth of the relationships we build, the passion we bring or the reason we do what we do. While we recognize that rules and regulations are usually required to ensure some order, working within the confines of systems without challenging the things that perpetuate inequity is exactly why victimization continues. That is why at Victim Services of Durham Region we do things differently. Our mandate is "love", our collective job description is "to help" and our policy is "shared humanity".

This year our team received five award nominations; but we were 'winning' long before we received those nominations. The real reward for us is seeing a victim of intimate partner violence rebuild their life, living safely and achieving educational milestones. It is helping a newcomer connect with individuals who want to help rather than exploit them. It is receiving a letter from a young human trafficking survivor who is now two years clean that says "If I didn't have your support I don't know where I would be today. Thank you for another chance at life, another chance with my family, another chance at myself and giving hope to girls like me". It is working in partnership with our Survivor Advisory Panel to ensure that we are amplifying the voices of those who once had their voice, and their choice, taken away.

Our work is difficult and drastically under-funded. The challenges, the trauma, and the barriers to helping are all relentless; but so are we. We will continue to stand together, with Survivors to prevent victimization and inequity by challenging the status quo. We will continue to walk the path of healing alongside those who need us most and together, will continue to make a difference.

Victim Services of Durham Region (VSDR) provides free, confidential crisis intervention services immediately following a crime or sudden tragedy. Our prevention programming reaching in excess of 40,000 individuals this past year. Our supports are trauma-informed, Survivor-centric, and values the unique needs and experiences of every Survivor.
